

Safety Blast - Are You Dressed Correctly?

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

8 Pieces of PPE Recommended in a Lumber Yard

- 1. **Hard Hats -** to protect against falling objects.
- 2. High Visibility Clothing when working near trucks, Forklifts, or other vehicles one should wear high visibility garments to make them as visible as possible to nearby operators.
- 3. **Safety Shoes -** to protect against falling objects or punctures through the bottoms of the shoe. A good pair of safety shoes will also reduce the risk of slips/trips/falls.
- 4. Ear Protection If working in noisy areas you should always wear ear protection. Keep in mind even if the noise is not uncomfortably loud it can still cause long-term hearing loss. (According to OSHA Permissible Exposure Limits (PEL) is 90dBA for an 8-hour day)
- 5. Eye Protection Safety glasses or face shields should always be worn if doing a task that generates flying particles. This includes sawdust, particles do not need to be big to cause eye damage.
- 6. Gloves these are useful when handling all materials. This will help prevent against splinters, skin irritations, along with lacerations, cuts, and punctures.
- 7. **Dust Mask -** when generating sawdust that cannot be collected in a dust extraction system. This will protect your lungs especially when working with chemically treated woods.
- 8. ICE Grips preventing slips/trips/falls due to inclement weather (SILBA is a member of the Winter Walking Program see link for more info https://www.zeroslips.com/usi)

PPE for Truck Drivers

- Hard Hats should be worn whenever the driver is outside the truck cab.
- Eye Protection should be made available to all drivers for when they encounter a situation that might require them.
- Hand Protection gloves will help protect against laceration, punctures and reduce injury from caught in/between
- High Visibility Clothing to increase visibility when delivering on the roadway or construction site.
- Safety Shoes will assist in protecting against slips/trips/falls along with struck by and caught in / between injuries. Safety shoes includes **ICE Grips**.
- Ear Protection must be made available when encountering a situation that might require hearing protection.



- Meets industry standards.
- Is maintained in serviceable condition.
- Is used consistently in the field.
